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# About this Manual:

This manual describes basic programming for the SYSMAC CV-series Programmable Controllers (PCs) using the CV500-CPU01-E, CV1000-CPU01-E, CV2000-CPU01-E, and CVM1-CPU01-E/11-E CPU Units. Although the CV500, CV1000, and CV2000 support both SFC and ladder-diagram programming, the CVM1 supports only ladder-diagram programming and no information in this manual concerning SFC programming is applicable to it. This manual is designed to be used together with two other CVSS Operation Manuals. An introductory guide is also available. The entire set of CVSS manuals is listed below. Catalog number suffixes have been omitted; be sure you have the most recent version for your region.

Please read this manual completely together with the other CV-series PC manuals, CVSS manuals, and Link Unit manuals and be sure you understand the information provide before attempting to program or operate a CV-series PC. The basic content of each section of this manual is outlined below.

**Section 1** provides basic reference material that should be useful when using the CVSS, including lists of operations with references to the proper manual, tables of ladder-diagram instructions, a PC data area table, and abbreviations to aid reading CVSS displays.

**Section 2** explains how to connect the PC and peripheral devices to the computer, make backup copies of CVSS, and install CVSS on the computer's hard disk.

**Section 3** explains how to select operations from the menus and sub-menus and how to manipulate data in memory. The structure of memory, data files, and programs is also described.

**Section 4** provides an introduction to the procedures necessary to set up a basic PC system, write SFC and ladder programs, transfer the program to the PC, and monitor program execution. The use of I/O names in programming is also explained briefly.

Section 5 provides a list of error messages and probable causes of errors that can occur with CVSS.

# **SECTION 1 Introduction**

This section provides basic reference material that should be useful when using the CVSS. The lists of operations include the main operations covered in the three CVSS manuals with page references to the proper manual. The tables of ladder-diagram instructions can be used to find instructions either by function code, functional group, or mnemonic. The PC data area tables outlines the data areas available for use in programming, and the abbreviations are to aid reading CVSS displays. Read the CV-series PC Operation Manuals and Installation Guide before using the CVSS.

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# 1-1 CVSS Basics

### 1-1-1 CVSS Package

The CVSS package includes the CV Support Software (CVSS) Version 2, which is available on either 3.5" or 5.25" low density floppy disks, and three Operation Manuals.

The CVSS package with 3.5" floppy disks contains 2 install disks, while the package with 5.25" disks contains 7 install disks. Make backup copies of the install disks and store the originals in a safe place as a precaution. The file compressing application DIET was used with CVSS.

The floppy disks should be inserted into the floppy disk drive only when the computer is on. Disks should also be removed when the computer is on, but never when the floppy disk drive indicator is lit (indicating that the computer is writing to or reading from the disk).

### 1-1-2 Computer Specifications

CV Support Software (CVSS) Version 2 is a powerful tool providing online and offline support of CV-series PCs. CVSS can be installed on an IBM-compatible computer running DOS version 3.20 or higher as long as the computer meets the minimum specifications listed in the table below.

- **Note** 1. MS-DOS is a registered trademark of the Microsoft Corporation.
  - 2. For the IBM PC/AT-compatible or PS/2 Model 50 computers (80286 machines), we recommend the user add a RAM disk with a memory size of 2M bytes minimum for smooth operation of the CVSS.

Online operations can be performed with CVSS when the optional RS-232C Communications Board is used. CVSS can support up to 2 ports. Refer to the relevant Operation Manual for details on settings necessary when using a Communications Board.

# 1-1-3 CVSS Features

Programming	Programming with CVSS is simpler because operations can be selected from menus. The PC program can be written either with or without SFC programming. Ladder programs can be entered either as diagrams or by mnemonics. SFC (Sequential Function Chart) programming conforms to IEC standards and SFC action and transition programs are entered as ladder programs.
	The program can be edited online when the optional RS-232C Communications Board is used.
Debugging and Monitoring	Program execution can be debugged and monitored with the Debug, SFC Moni- tor, Ladder Diagram Monitor, Program Trace, and Data Trace operations.
Communications with PCs in Link Systems	The computer running CVSS can communicate with any PC that is connected to it through a SYSMAC NET Link or SYSMAC LINK System.
1-1-4 CVSS Version	2.1 Improvements
	The following information is provided for convenience for readers already famil- iar with version 1 of the CVSS.
New CPU Unit Support	Version 2.1 supports three new CPU Units, the CV2000-CPU01-E, the CVM1-CPU01-E, and the CVM1-CPU11-E. The CVM1 CPU Units are designed as low-cost model to provide efficient machine control and the CV2000 CPU Unit, with an I/O capacity of 2,048 points, now provides the largest capacity of the CV-series PCs.
Programming and Monitorin	<b>g</b> Two program input modes have been provided for flexibility: the mode originally provided in version 1 (CV mode) and the input mode used with the LSS (C mode); the location of the program location that was last displayed and display mode that were last used are recorded in memory and automatically restored when the program is displayed again; and searches during cross-referencing now apply to all ladder diagrams held in memory and not just the current one; and the search operation is automatically entered when the monitoring operation is specified to save key inputs (the F1 Key can be pressed to cancel the

- **Comparison Operations** You can compare the program in the PC with the program in the CVSS work file by specifying *Program compare* under the *Transfer program and data* operation. This is the same operation as is available for C-series PCs using the LSS. You can also compare the program in the CVSS work file to a program in a file on a disk to display the differences between them. Select *Program compare* from the main offline menu.
- Global Changes Bit and word addresses are now easier to globally change and can be done when using I/O comments.
- **CPU Bus Unit Settings** New operations have been added to set CPU Bus Unit operating parameters.
- **Customization** It is possible to register or delete an HIS program.

### 1-1-5 Differences between LSS and CVSS

There are several differences between LSS (Ladder Support Software) and CVSS operation. These differences are described below.

- 1, 2, 3... 1. Menu selection, display, and key operation
  - a) The number of headings in the main menus and the size of the display has been increased. The Esc Key can be pressed to return to the main menu from any operation display.
  - b) CVSS can be switched between offline and online operation whenever a main menu is being displayed.
  - c) Letter designations are possible in the menu of each operation.
  - 2. Programming (common features)
    - a) The PC program can be written with or without SFC programming.
    - b) The program can be made easier to understand by using I/O names instead of bit or word addresses.
  - 3. Programming (ladder diagrams)
    - a) Instruction operands are displayed along the side.
    - b) Instructions can be entered in the ladder diagram using mnemonics or function codes.
    - c) I/O comments can be up to 30 characters long.
    - d) The Clear mode has been eliminated.
  - 4. Programming (mnemonic)

The screen can display only 20 lines because I/O comments can now be 30 characters long.

5. Other offline operations

Directories can be made on data disks.

- 6. Other online operations
  - a) CVSS can communicate with PCs in a SYSMAC NET Link System without using a SYSMAC NET Link Interface Board.
  - b) Monitoring is possible even if the program in the PC is different from the program on the computer's hard disk.
  - c) The program, DM, etc. can be transferred together with the Transfer Program and Data operation.
  - d) A PC ID can be assigned to each node on a network and this ID can be used to identify the node instead of the network and node addresses.



# 2-1-1 Connecting the Computer to the PC


The computer is connected to the PC through either a 9-pin or 25-pin RS-232C port on the computer and the 9-pin RS-232C host interface connector or peripheral connector on the PC CPU Unit. The user must provide a cable that is wired for this connection as shown below. Refer to 2-1-3 *Wiring RS-232C and RS-422 Cable Connectors* for details on preparing RS-232C cables.

- **Note** 1. You must use the CV500-CIF01 in combination with a conversion cable. To make the conversion cable, refer to *Tool Bus Connections* which follows.
  - Before you connect the PC to the computer via the Tool Bus Interface, use the CVSS system setting operation (offline) to select the binary system, and make sure that the communications speed that you set coincides with the Tool Bus communications speed that has been set with the DIP switches on the front panel of the PC.
  - 3. Before you connect the PC to the computer via the Host Link Unit Interface, use the CVSS system setting operation (offline) to select the ASCII system, and make sure that your setting coincides with the Host Link communication system in the PC system setting.

### 2-1-2 Connecting the Computer to a Printer

The computer is connected to a printer through a printer port on the computer. The operator must provide a standard Centronics interface cable. Centronics interface cables are commercially available.

### 2-1-3 Wiring RS-232C and RS-422 Cable Connectors

The following procedures should be followed when wiring RS-232C and RS-422 connectors. Both the connectors and the cable are commercially available.

#### Shielded Wire Connecting to FG

The procedures listed below correspond to the following diagrams.


- *1, 2, 3...* 1. Cut the cable to the required length.
  - 2. Use a razor blade to cut away the sheath (being careful not to damage the braiding underneath): 25 mm for RS-422 cable; 40 mm for RS-232C cable.
  - 3. Use scissors to cut away all but 10 mm of the exposed braiding.
  - 4. Use wire strippers to remove the insulation from the last 5 mm of each wire.
  - 5. Move the boot to cut the edge of the sheath and fold the braiding back over the end of it.

- 25 (RS-422) 40 (RS-2320)
- 6. Wrap aluminum foil tape over the top of the braiding on top of the boot for one and a half turns.

#### Shielded Wire Not Connecting to FG

The procedures outlined in the list below correspond to the following diagrams.

- 1, 2, 3... 1. Cut the cable to the required length.
  - 2. Use a razor blade to cut away the sheath: 25 mm for RS-422 cable; 40 mm for RS-232C cable.
  - 3. Use scissors to cut away the exposed braiding.
  - 4. Use wire strippers to remove the insulation from the last 5 mm of all wires.
  - 5. Wrap insulating tape over the top and end of the the cut sheath.




Soldering

Observe the following when soldering the prepared wires onto the connectors.

- *1, 2, 3...* 1. Place heat-shrinking tubes over all wires, far enough away from the end so as not to interfere with the soldering.
  - 2. Pre-solder all wires and connector terminals.

- 3. Solder wires, inserting 4 mm of the exposed 5 mm of wire into the connector terminal.
- 4. Move the heat-shrinking tubes onto the soldered area and shrink them into place.

Assemble the hood as shown in the following diagram. Be sure to connect one end of the shielded wire to FG.



#### Handling CVSS Floppy Disks 2-2

#### 2-2-1 Using the Floppy Disks

The CVSS package includes the CV Support Software Version 2 (CVSS) on either 3.5" high-density floppy disks or 5.25" low density floppy disks.

CVSS package	Contents	Notes
CV500-ZS3AT1-EV2	Install disks 1 to 2	High density (1.44M byte) 3.5" disks
CV500-ZS5AT1-EV2	Install disks 1 to 7	Low density (360K byte) 5.25" disks

The install disks contain the actual CV Support Software Version 2 that is installed on the computer's work disk.

As a precaution, make backup copies of the install disks and store the originals in a safe place. After the CVSS is installed on the work disk, the install disks won't be needed unless the files on the work disk or the work disk itself are damaged, but it is always a good idea to have an extra copy of the software just in case. The procedure for making backup copies of floppy disks is described in 2-2-2 Copying Floppy Disks.

The floppy disks should be inserted into the floppy disk drive only when the computer is on. Disks should also be removed when the computer is on, but never when the floppy disk drive indicator is lit (indicating that the computer is writing to or reading from the disk). Removing a disk when the LED indicator is on can destroy files on the disk.

### 2-2-2 Copying Floppy Disks

The install disks should be copied to prevent accidental loss of the data they contain. The following procedure uses a single floppy disk drive. Refer to your DOS User's Guide for details on using the diskcopy command.

- 1, 2, 3... 1. Purchase the same type of disk that is to be copied and make sure that the new disks are not write-protected (the sliding tab on the lower left corner of the floppy disk should cover the hole). The original disks should remain write-protected.
  - 2. Turn the computer on. When DOS loads from the work disk, the DOS prompt will appear on the display.

C:\>

- 3. Type DISKCOPY A: A: and press Enter. Your display should look like this: C:\>DISKCOPY A: A: Insert SOURCE diskette in drive A: Press any key to continue...
- 4. Insert the disk that you want to copy (SOURCE) into drive A and press any key.
- 5. When the data on the original disk has been copied into the computer, your display should look like this:

```
Copying 80 tracks
9 Sectors/Track, 2 Side(s)
Insert TARGET diskette in drive A:
Press any key to continue...
```

- 6. Remove the original disk, insert the new disk into drive A, and press any key.
- 7. Your display should look like this if there is some uncopied data remaining on the source disk:

Formatting while copying
Insert SOURCE diskette in drive A:
Press any key to continue...
```

- 8. If there is some uncopied data remaining, repeat steps 4, 5, and 6.
- 9. When all of the data has been copied onto the new disk, your display will look like this:

Volume Serial Number is 1AD2-0F14 Copy another diskette (Y/N)? N

- 10. If you want to copy another disk, type Y, press Enter, and repeat steps 4 through 9. If you don't want to copy another disk, type N and press Enter.
- 11. Make sure that backup install disks are write-protected by sliding the tab on the lower left corner of the floppy disk so that a hole appears where the tab had been.

# 2-3 CVSS Installation

To use the CVSS, it must first be installed on a DOS hard disk with a minimum of 4 megabytes of free space. Basically speaking, this means copying the CVSS from the install disks it is supplied on to the hard disk using the installation utility provided on one of the install disks. You will thus need a computer with a floppy disk drive and a formatted hard disk running DOS.

The CVSS needs to be installed only once unless the data on your hard disk is damaged or requires reformatting. Once you have installed the CVSS, store the install disks in a safe place. You will want to make an additional copy for extra protection. If you have not yet backed up the install disks, refer to 2-2-2 Copying *Floppy Disks* for the procedure.

The installation procedure is described below.

*1, 2, 3...* 1. Turn on the computer and startup DOS from the hard disk. The DOS prompt should appear.

C:\>

 Insert install disk 1 into the floppy disk, change the current drive to the floppy disk drive, and execute INSTALL to activate the installation utility. The following display will appear.

**Note** The last item on the above display, "E:Exit to dos prompt" can be used anytime this menu is displayed to return to DOS.

3. Select and specify each of the first four items on the display, pressing the Enter Key after specifying each one. These are outlined below with possible values given in parentheses. Items can be selected either with the Cursor Keys or by typing the letter given at the far left of each item.

Item	Meaning
S:Source drive	Specify the floppy drive that contains the install disk. (A to Z)
T:Target drive	Specify the hard disk drive onto which the CVSS is to be installed. This will normally be drive C. (A to Z)
P:target Path	Specify the directory path name where the CVSS is to be installed. (Any legal DOS directory name; avoid long names.)
D:Disk Configuration	Specify whether the hard disk is being used alone or together with a work disk. (HARD or HARD+WORK DISK)

4. If a work disk is specified for the disk configuration, you will also be asked the size of the work disk, the disk drive name of the work disk, and which part of the software is to be placed in the work disk first (if the work disk is large enough, it makes no difference which part is selected). Input the requested data. When you type the letter D and press the Enter key for the work disk drive D, the following will be displayed on the screen so that you can set the bus that includes VDISK.SYS for the work disk driver. To short-cut, press \, input the path name, and press the Enter key.

[Device Driver Path]

- **Note** You do not necessarily have to use the work disk just because your computer is equipped with one; the choice is yours. Using the work disk, however, will increase the operation speed of the CVSS.
- 5. When the above settings have been completed, the initial display will return and actual installation can begin. To install, select "X:eXecute installation" and then confirm installation when the confirmation prompt appears.
- 6. Once installation has started, you will be asked if CONFIG.SYS and AUTO-EXEC.BAT should be updated. If they are not updated, sample files with CVS will be copied to the target directory. If they are updated, the extensions of the old files will be changed to CVS and new files will be created as described below. Here, it is assumed that CVSS is being run under the same environment as LSS.

- a) Change the CONFIG.SYS file name to CONFIG.CVS.
- b) If VDISK.SYS is written on the old CONFIG.SYS when a work disk is used, change only the work disk size and the description of the VDISK.SYS path. If VDISK.SYS is not written on the CONFIG.SYS, add the following:

c) If the host link disk driver (SPDWADRV.DEV) and tool bus device driver (SPDTLDRV.DEV) have been already written on the old CONFIG.SYS, change only the description of the path. If neither SPDWADRV.DEV nor SPDTLDRV.DEV has been written on the old CONFIG.SYS, add the following:

DEVICE=C:\(add Target path)\SPDWADRV.DEV

DEVICE=C:\(add Target path)\SPDTLDRV.DEV

- d) Change the AUTOEXEC.BAT file name to AUTOEXEC.CVS.
- e) Add "C:\CVS" to the path for AUTOEXEC.BAT.
- f) Add the following line to AUTOEXEC.BAT.

#### SET CVERR=C:\CVS

Input Y or N and press the Enter Key to continue installation. The names of the file currently being installed will be displayed on the display.

- You will be asked to change the install disk and press a key from the keyboard as installation proceeds. Change the disks as instructed until all of the CVSS has been installed.
- If the settings in CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT do not suit your computers configuration, use a standard screen editor and changes the settings as required.
- Once the last disk has been inserted and installation completed, you will be asked to reboot the computer. Remove the last install disk from the drive and simultaneously press the Ctrl, Alt, and Del Keys to reboot the system.

### 2-4 Starting CVSS

The CVSS can be started by changing to the directory into which CVSS is installed and entering CVS. An example is shown below.

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# 3-1 Operating Modes and Screen Displays


There are two basic CVSS operating modes: online and offline. In the offline mode, the CVSS is operated independently from the PC. In the online mode, the CVSS is operated while communicating with the PC. The operations that are possible vary with the operating mode.

To switch between online and offline mode, go to the main menu for the mode you are in, press the Shift+F1 Keys. The mode and menu display will change. You must be connected to the PC to enter online mode.






### Ladder Program View Mode

# 3-2 Keyboard


The 10 function keys (F1 to F10) are used to select the functions displayed at the bottom of the display. For example, when inputting a program, the function keys can be used to perform functions and input symbols or instructions into the program.

A second set of functions will be displayed at the bottom of the display when the Shift Key is pressed. Press the desired function key while holding down the Shift Key to perform one of these functions.

# 3-3 Using the Menus

This section shows how to move between displays and how to select the desired operation from the menus. There are two ways to select an operation from the menu displayed on the screen:

- *1, 2, 3...* 1. Press the letter key of the letter that precedes the operation in the menu.
  - 2. Move the cursor until the desired operation is highlighted and then press the Enter Key.

## 3-3-1 Offline Operations

The diagram below shows the main offline menu as it appears when the program is started. To return to the main menu from another offline operation, press Ctrl+M. To return to the original display, press either the Esc or Shift+Esc Keys.





# 3-3-2 Online Operations

With the main offline menu displayed on the screen, press the Shift+F1 Keys to place the CVSS online with the PC. The main online menu will appear as shown below. You can place the CVSS online only when the main offline menu is displayed, the PC and computer are connected, and the PC is ON. Also, you can take the CVSS offline only when the main online menu is displayed.

To return to the main menu from another online menu, press the End or Ctrl+M Keys. To return to the original display, press either the Esc or Shift+Esc Keys. While the CVSS is online with the PC, the PC mode can be changed by pressing F7 to F10 Keys while holding down the Shift Key.





# **3-4 Memory Configuration**

The CV Support Software Version 2 uses three memory media: the main memory, the work disk, and data disks.

Main MemoryThe main memory is the computer's RAM memory. Data stored in the main<br/>memory is lost when the computer power is turned off.

The work disk is the usually the computer's hard disk, but can be a combination of a hard disk and a RAM disk. The user selects whether a hard disk or a combination of hard disk and a RAM disk will be used during installation. If the RAM disk capacity is 5M bytes or higher, it is large enough to act as the work disk by itself.


When using a RAM disk, always select the END operation from the main menu when closing CVSS.

**Data Disks** Data disks are floppy disks that are used to contain various data.

#### Offline Data Flow

Always transfer new or modified SFC programs or ladder diagrams from the main memory to the work disk with the Write Sheet or Store operations. If the data in main memory isn't transferred to the work disk, it will be lost when changing to another main menu or changing between SFC Detail View Mode and SFC Program View Mode.

The following diagram shows the flow of data between the three memory media.



**Note** 1. Data link tables, routing tables, and program link parameters are not written to the work disk. Data is saved directly to the data disk from the main memory and retrieved directly from the data disk to the main memory. With this procedure, data link tables, routing tables, and program link parameters are saved or loaded.

### **Online Data Flow**

In online operation, most data is transferred between the PC and the computer's work disk, main memory, or data disk.

Monitoring and online editing use the program in the PC, not the one in the work disk. On the other hand, I/O names, I/O comments, block comments, and PC names are not stored in the PC but in the work disk. Be sure that the I/O names, I/O comments, and block comments in the work disk agree with the ones used to create the PC program.

PC Setup information, trace memory, the routing table, and the data link table cannot be transferred between the PC and the work disk. Customized data cannot be transferred between the PC and the data disk.

A list of files showing the filenames and filename extensions can be displayed by selecting the File management operation from the main offline or online menu and then selecting File directory. The file directory can also be displayed by pressing the Esc Key when inputting a filename to save a file to the data disk or load a file from the data disk.

The diagram below is an example of a file directory. The file type can be determined from the filename extension. Filename extensions are automatically attached by the CVSS, so it isn't necessary to type them in. It is sometimes useful to give the same filename to files that closely related but of different file types. In this example a program file and its object file have the same filename "SAMPLE" and are distinguished by their filename extensions.



### About Directories

Managing files becomes complicated as more and more PC programs, I/O tables, DM data files, etc. are added to a data disk. To simplify file management, directories are used to organize files into groups. Directories are like drawers in a file cabinet. Different drawers contain files organized by some grouping: date, owner, client, etc.

The following diagram shows a directory tree for a data disk in which two directories, LINE1 and LINE2, have been created.



In order to create the directories shown in the diagram, select the Create/Delete Directory operation from the File Management menu and create the two directories, A : \LINE1 and A : \LINE2.

A file is identified by its directory and filename. As an example, the WELD-ING.COD program in directory LINE1 would be saved as A : \LINE1\WELDING in the Program Save operation. Refer to 6-1 File Management in the CV Support Software Version 2 Operation Manual: Offline for details.

Directories can be created within directories. In other words, directories can be nested. To create a directory called OLD within the LINE1 directory, create the directory A : \LINE1\OLD with the Create/del directory operation from the File Management menu.

# 3-6 Program Structure

This section describes the data generated when an SFC program is created, and how that data is handled.

## 3-6-1 Types of Data


Three types of data are generated when making an SFC program: the SFC program itself,  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{I/O}}$  names, and comments.

#### The Program

The SFC program is made up of SFC (Sequential Flow Charts) as well as action and transition programs.

SFC


Sequential flow charts are created in units called "sheets." A single SFC sheet is edited when programming is selected from the main menu in SFC Detail View mode. Refer to the CV500/CV1000 Operation Manual: SFC for details on SFC programming.



The SFC program is composed of separate sheets with different sheet numbers, and must end with a single sheet. The separate programs can include the main program, the power OFF interrupt program, the power ON interrupt program, scheduled interrupt programs 0 and 1, I/O interrupt programs 00 to 31, and sub-chart programs.

Only the main program can be divided into more than one sheet. When the main program is divided into multiple sheets, each sheet must either contain an initial step or must be activated from another sheet using an step control instruction to be executed.

Only one program can be created within one sheet. A syntax error would occur if the programs shown in the following example were created in a single sheet.



When the program type has been set to "Ladder" in the System Setup so the program is input only with ladder diagrams, SFC parts are generated automatically and the user input on the ladder-diagram program. Refer to the CV500/CV1000 Operation Manual: Ladder Diagrams for details on ladder diagrams.

Programs corresponding to actions and transitions in the SFC are input as ladder diagrams or in mnemonics. Write each action and transition program by selecting programming from the main menu and then switching to SFC Program View mode.



#### I/O Names

I/O names can be assigned to bit addresses, word addresses, step numbers, action numbers, or transition numbers. I/O names can be written into the program instead of bit and word addresses allowing the program to be completed before the I/O bit and word allocation has been decided. Refer to *4-3-3 Later Assignment of I/O Addresses* for details.


#### **Comments**

There are two kinds of comments, I/O comments and block comments. These are short sentences that can be written into the program to explain details of the program such as the operation of bits or program sections. Comments can be displayed on the CVSS display or printed out.

#### I/O comments I/O comments are used to explain the operation of I/O bits or words in the program. One I/O comment up to 30 characters long can be attached to an I/O bit or word. To create I/O comments, select the Edit I/O Comments operation from the main menu.

#### **Block Comments**


Block Comments are used to explain details about the operation of instruction blocks in ladder diagram programs.



Up to 512 block comments (total) can be contained in action and transition programs, and these 512 block comments can contain up to 65,536 characters. For example, only 327 block comments could be created if each block comment were 200 characters long.

# 3-6-2 Transferring Program Data to the Data Disk

The program, I/O names, and comments files described in 3-6-1 Types of Data are created on the computer's work disk. Each of these files can be saved to (and later retrieved from) the data disk.



In SFC Detail View mode, the Save Program and Retrieve Program operations transfer both the SFC and ladder/mnemonic parts of the program, while in SFC Program View Mode, the Save Program and Retrieve Program operations transfer only on the ladder part.

# 3-6-3 Transferring Program Data to the PC

Only the program itself is transferred to the PC, not the I/O names or comments. To transfer the program, select the Transfer Program & Data from the main online menu, and then select Computer (System work) -> PC from the sub-menu. As the CVSS data is transferred, it is simultaneously converted to the machine language used by the PC. It is possible to separate the conversion and transferral processes by following the procedure below.

- *1, 2, 3...* 1. First convert the program on the data disk to machine language with the Convert UM operation in the main offline menu.
  - 2. Transfer the file created in step 1 by selecting Transfer Program & Data from the main online menu, and then selecting Computer (Data disk) -> PC from the sub-menu.


**Note** Do not transfer SFC programs to a CVM1 CPU Unit.

# **3-6-4** Transferring Program Data from the PC

To transfer the program from the PC to the CVSS, select Transfer Program & Data from the main online menu, and then select PC  $\rightarrow$  Computer (System work) from the sub-menu. The data is converted from machine language as it is transferred. Follow the procedure below to separate the conversion and transferral processes.

- 1. First transfer the program in the PC to the computer's data disk by selecting Transfer Program & Data from the main online menu, and then selecting PC -> Computer (Data disk) from the sub-menu.
  - 2. Convert the program transferred to the data disk from machine language to the language used by the CVSS with the Convert UM operation in the main offline menu.

The following diagram shows the relationship between data in the PC and data on the computer's work disk.



# SECTION 4 Basic Procedures

This section provides an introduction to the procedures necessary to set up a basic PC system, write SFC and ladder programs, transfer the programs to the PC, and monitor program execution. The use of I/O names in programming is also explained briefly.

# 4-1 SFC

This section provides an introduction to the procedures necessary to set up a basic PC system, write an SFC program, transfer the program to the PC, and monitor program execution. This information is provided for users not familiar with the CVSS. Details on SFC programming and monitoring are provided in the *CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Online* and *CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Online* and *CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Online* and *CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Online*.

Note The CMV1 CPU Units do not support SFC programming.

## 4-1-1 Overview

The overall procedure for starting the CVSS and programming and monitoring the SFC program is given below. Further details on each step are provided in the remainder of this section. The following represent the minimum settings required and are not intended to be complete operating instructions.

- Start the CVSS. If you have started the CVSS before, it is only necessary to turn on your computer and run the CVSS program. Refer to the sections on installing and starting CVSS earlier in this manual for details.
  - a) Back up the system disks containing the CVSS program.
  - b) Install the CVSS onto the hard disk.
  - c) Run the CVSS program.
  - 2. Set the CVSS operating environment from the System Setup display.
    - a) Set the program type to SFC and ladder to enable usage of SFC.
    - b) Set the PC model for the program check.
  - 3. Create the steps and transitions of the SFC program using the detail view in offline mode.
    - a) Clear the entire user program area from the work disk.
    - b) Create the steps and transitions of the SFC program. These steps and transitions will determine the overall flow of the program.
    - c) Create an action block for each step.
    - d) Check the SFC program.
    - e) When each SFC program has been finished, write the sheet to the work disk.
  - 4. Create the action programs and transition programs in offline mode.
    - a) Switch to the program view. You have to be in program view to write action and transition programs.
    - b) Specify and write an action or transition program using a ladder diagram.
    - c) Save the ladder-diagram program to your work disk whenever 22 lines have been written.
    - d) When an entire ladder-diagram program has been written, save any part that has not been saved to the work disk and check it to be sure that there are no programming errors.
  - 5. Back up the completed SFC program on a data disk. The floppy disk must be formatted in advance.
  - 6. Connect the PC.
    - a) Install the PC, mounting all I/O Units and connecting the proper power supplies.
    - b) Connect your computer to the PC using the host link interface on the PC.
  - 7. Go online with the PC.
    - a) Set the host link interface specifications. Select ASCII communications mode from the system setup menu.

- b) Turn on the power supply to the PC.
- c) With the main offline menu showing, press the Shift+F1 Keys to go online.
- 8. Register the I/O table.
- 9. Transfer the program to the PC.
- 10. Switch the PC to MONITOR Mode and monitor program execution from the CVSS.

#### 4-1-2 General Guidelines

To select operations and settings in the following procedures either you can move the cursor with the cursor keys and press the Enter Key when the desired item is in reverse video or you can press the letter given at the left of the item or setting.

To return to the previous display, press the Esc Key. To return to the beginning of the current operation, press the Shift+Esc Keys.

When using the Shift Key in combination with another key, always press the other key while holding down the Shift Key.

Typing mistakes in input fields can be deleted with the Backspace Key to delete one character at a time or with the Home Key to return the entire field to its original value. If you have already completed and confirmed an incorrect input, repeat the steps leading up to that input to correct the mistake.

#### 4-1-3 Procedures

#### Starting the CVSS


If you have not installed the CVSS, refer to the procedures given earlier in this manual. Once the CVSS has been installed, type "CVSS" at the DOS prompt. This will start the program and the main offline menu will appear as shown below.


26. If errors are displayed, the program will need correction before it can be executed. If no errors are displayed, press the Shift+Esc Keys to exit from the check and return to the SFC detail view programming display.




Creating the Action and Transition Programs

Once the overall structure of the SFC program has been input, ladder diagrams must be created for all action and transition programs using the following procedure.



- 12. When the save is finished, remove the floppy disk and turn off the computer.

# **Connecting the PC** Next, the PC must be set up and connected to the computer running CVSS using the following procedure.

- *1, 2, 3...* 1. Set up the PC, mounting all I/O Units according to desired I/O word allocations and wire power supplies.
  - Connect the computer running CVSS to the host link interface on the PC's CPU Unit as shown in the following diagram, being sure that connect screws are tightened properly.



3. Turn on power to both the computer and the PC.

4. Restart the CVSS. The main offline menu will appear.



#### **Going Online**

  - 2. Here, you can set the necessary specifications so that the PC is connected to the host computer via the host link interface. If you plan to use the tool bus interface, refer to CV Support Software Version 2: Offline, 7-1 System Setup.

If you have not already set the communications specifications for the host link interface, select "C:Comm use" from the next menu. The following display will appear. Press the A Key to select ASCII.



- Set the port, baud rate, PC unit number, parity, data length, number of stop bits, and the communication monitoring time for the computer. These settings must match those of the PC.
- 4. Press the Shift+Esc and Esc Keys to return to the main offline menu.



- **Note** Do not remove the connecting cable between the computer and the PC while the CVSS is online with the PC. Always take the CVSS offline before removing the connecting cable.
- **Registering the I/O Table** An I/O table must be registered in order for the PC to properly access an I/O point. The following procedure can be used to automatically generate an I/O table according to the Units actually mounted to PC Racks.



Now that the program has been transferred to the PC, the PC can be switched to MONITOR Mode so that the program can be tested. 





The following display shows what happens when CIO 000100 is forced OFF by pressing the F8 Key. Although the status of CIO 000100 is changed, ST0001 remains active.



- 9. Press the Shift+F4 Keys to release the forced status of any bits that have been artificially set.
- 10. Press the Shift+Esc Keys once to return to the monitor display and then again to return to the main online menu.

This completes the basic SFC programming and monitoring procedure. When you have finished, always take the CVSS offline by pressing the Shift+F1 Keys from the main online menu, remove any floppy disks, and turn off power to the computer and PC.

# 4-2 Ladder

This section provides an introduction to the procedures necessary to set up a basic PC system, write a program using ladder diagrams, transfer the program to the PC, and monitor program execution. This information is provided for users not familiar with the CVSS. Details on ladder programming and monitoring are provided in the CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Online and CV Support Software Version 2 Manual: Offline.

#### 4-2-1 Overview

The overall procedure for starting the CVSS and programming and monitoring the ladder program is given below. Further details on each step are provided in the remainder of this section. The following represent the minimum settings required and are not intended to be complete operating instructions.

- Start the CVSS. If you have started the CVSS before, it is only necessary to turn on your computer and run the CVSS program. Refer to the sections on installing and starting CVSS earlier in this manual for details.
  - a) Back up the system disks containing the CVSS program.
  - b) Install the CVSS onto the hard disk.
  - c) Run the CVSS program.
  - 2. Set the CVSS operating environment from the System Setup display.
    - a) Set the program type to Ladder.
    - b) Set the PC model for the program check.
  - 3. This section explains how to input a ladder program without I/O comments and block comments. Before beginning to input a program, prepare the I/O bit and word allocations, program coding, etc.
    - a) Clear the entire user program area from the work disk.
    - b) Write the ladder diagram on the CVSS display.

- c) Save the ladder-diagram program from the display buffer to your work disk with the Store operation (the F3 key). The display buffer can hold 22 lines at most, so the ladder-diagram program must be saved when 22 lines have been written.
- d) When an entire ladder-diagram program has been written, save any part that has not been saved to the work disk and check it to be sure that there are no programming errors.
- 4. Back up the completed ladder program on a data disk. The floppy disk must be formatted in advance.
- 5. Connect the PC.
  - a) Install the PC, mounting all I/O Units and connecting the proper power supplies.
  - b) Connect your computer to the PC using the host link interface on the PC.
- 6. Go online with the PC.
  - a) Set the host link interface or peripheral interface specifications.
  - b) Turn on the power supply to the PC.
  - c) With the main offline menu showing, press the Shift+F1 Keys to go online.
- 7. Register the I/O table.
- 8. Transfer the program to the PC.
- 9. Switch the PC to MONITOR mode and monitor program execution from the CVSS.

#### 4-2-2 General Guidelines

To select operations and settings in the following procedures either you can move the cursor with the cursor keys and press the Enter Key when the desired item is in reverse video or you can press the letter given at the left of the item or setting.

To return to the previous display, press the Esc Key. To return to the beginning of the current operation, press the Shift+Esc Keys.

When using the Shift Key in combination with another key, always press the other key while holding down the Shift Key.

Typing mistakes in input fields can be deleted with the Backspace Key to delete one character at a time or with the Home Key to return the entire field to its original value. If you have already completed and confirmed an incorrect input, repeat the steps leading up to that input to correct the mistake.

### 4-2-3 Procedures

Starting the CVSS

If you have not installed the CVSS, refer to the procedures given earlier in this manual. Once the CVSS has been installed, type "CVSS" at the DOS prompt. This will start the program and the main offline menu will appear as shown below.

# Setting the CVSS Operating Environment

If you have not previously set the program type and PC model, use the following procedure to do so. If the current settings are okay, you can go directly to the next step, creating the ladder program.


*1, 2, 3...* 1. Select "Q:System setup" from the menu. The current settings of the CVSS operating environment will appear.

2. Select "T:Program type." The following setting will appear.



- 3. Select "L:Ladder." This will disable SFC programming. The program will be input with ladder diagrams or mnemonics only.
- 4. When the environment setting returns, select "K:Prog check PC." The following setting will appear.




5. Specify the PC for which the program check is to be made. In the rest of this section we will assume that a program is being written for the CV1000.


6. Press the Shift+Esc Keys to return to the main offline menu.

**Creating the Ladder Diagram** Prepare I/O bit and word allocations and program coding sheets before beginning to input a ladder diagram program. (If I/O names are used in the program instead of bit and word addresses, the I/O bit and word allocations can be decided after the program is entered.)


*1, 2, 3...* 1. Select "P:Program" from the main offline menu. The ladder diagram program display will appear.




2. Press the End Key to access the Program menu and select "C:Clear memory." The following display will appear.



- 3. Select "A:Clear all." A confirmation message will appear.
- 4. Input Y and press the Enter Key to confirm. All of the user program area in the work disk will be cleared, including I/O names and all program comments. The ladder diagram program display will appear again.



The next portion of this procedure shows how to input the following ladder diagram.



5. Press the F1 Key to enter the input mode. The cursor will move to the first column by program address 00000 and the program input can then proceed according to the above ladder diagram.



6. Press the F7 Key to designate the first NO (normally open) condition, input the address of the operand bit, and then press the Enter Key. (The F7 Key is not necessary in C input mode.) The specified condition will be displayed and the cursor will move one column to the right.


Leading zeros may be omitted from the bit address.

To correct a mistake in the bit address after the Enter Key has been pressed, move the cursor back to the condition, press the Enter Key, and reinput the bit address.




7. Press the F9 Key to designate the OUTPUT instruction, input the address of the operand bit, and then press the Enter Key. The OUTPUT instruction will be displayed and the cursor will move to the next line.


Again, leading zeros may be omitted from the bit address.



8. Press the F8 Key to designate the OR instruction, input the address of the operand bit, and then press the Enter Key.




 Next we will input the END instruction using its function code. Move the cursor to the beginning of the next line, press the F10 Key, input the function code, and then press the Enter Key. All leading zeros must be input for function codes.




This completes the ladder program. The program, however, exists only in the display buffer and it must be saved on the work disk before proceeding. If you leave the ladder program display or the power is turned off, the program will be lost. 10. To save the program, press the F3 Key and the Enter Key. A display will appear to indicate that the program is being saved. When the program has been saved, the ladder program display will return and the next program address will be displayed.

11. You can check the program that was saved by pressing the F1 Key to read out the program from the work disk and then using the PgUp Key to scroll through the program.



12. Once the program has been finished, it should be checked for programming errors. Press the End Key to access the menu and then select "K:Check program." The following sub-menu will appear.



13. Specify the desired check level(s). Here all levels are selected by pressing the 0 Key or the Enter Key.

The program check display will appear and a message will flash to indicate that the program is being checked. When the check is finished, the locations and types of errors found will be displayed. If the program contains no programming errors, a message indicating so will appear at the bottom of the display.

If errors are found in the program, it will need to be corrected, stored, and then checked again.

14. If there are no errors in the program, press the Shift+Esc Keys to end the program check and return to the ladder diagram program display.

Backing up the Program

Once the entire program has been written and saved onto the work disk, it should be backed up onto a floppy disk using the following procedure.

*1, 2, 3...* 1. Select "M:Format floppy" from the main offline menu. The following display will appear.

- 2. Insert a floppy disk into the drive. Be sure that the disk is not write-protected.
- 3. A confirmation message is displayed on the screen (initial display). Press the Y and Enter Keys.

4. Input the drive number and the disk media parameter. The following is an formatting example when you use a 3.5-inch (720 kb) disk.

The parameter varies with the computer. For details, refer 6-1 Initialization of CV Support Software Version 2: Offline or the MS-DOS manual provided with your computer.

- 5. Press the Enter Key. A message will appear indicating that the disk is being formatted. It will take 1 to 2 minutes to complete formatting the disk.
- 6. When formatting has been completed, press the N and Enter Keys.
- 7. The screen will return to the initial display. Press the Esc Key to return to the main offline menu.
- Select "P:Program" and then press the End Key to access the programming menu.

9. Select "S:Save Program." The following sub-menu will appear.



- 10. Select "Z:Save all." A prompt to input the file name will appear.
- 11. Input a file name in which to save the program and then press the Enter Key. The file name can be up to 8 characters long. When the Enter Key is pressed, a .COD extension will be added to the file name, which will automatically be displayed in all-caps, and a message will ask for a heading for the file.
- 12. Input the file heading and press the Enter Key. The heading can be up to 30 characters long and is case sensitive. Messages will indicate that the file is being saved and when the save is finished.
- 13. When the save is finished, remove the floppy disk.

**Connecting the PC** Next, the PC must be set up and connected to the computer running CVSS. Follow the procedures for connecting to the PC, shifting to online mode, registering the I/O table, and transferring the program that are described in this manual beginning on page 64.

- Monitoring the Program Now that the program has been transferred to the PC, the PC can be switched to MONITOR mode so that the program can be tested. I/O monitoring can be used to check the operation of the program by artificially controlling the status of I/O bits after the program has been transferred to the PC and I/O points have been wired.
  - *1, 2, 3...* 1. Select "M:Monitor" from the main online menu. The monitor display will appear.



2. Press the F1 Key and then the Shift+F8 Keys to place the PC into MONITOR


3. To monitor the status of specific I/O bits or words, press the End Key to access the menu and select "B:Monitor part I/O." The bottom of the display will change as shown below.



4. Specify the I/O bits and words to be monitored. The status of the specified bits will be displayed.


The following display shows how the display will appear if the following inputs are made. (The Enter Key can be pressed repeatedly to specify consecutive bits.)




To artificially control the status of a bit, move the cursor to the desired bit and press the F7 Key to turn ON the bit and the F8 Key to turn OFF the bit.

The following display shows how CIO 000200 turns ON when CIO 000001 is forced ON by pressing the F7 Key. The reverse video indicates that the execution condition for that part of the program is met when CIO 000001 turns ON.



The following display shows what happens when CIO 000001 is forced OFF by pressing the F8 Key. Although the status of CIO 000001 is changed, CIO 000200 remains ON because it is a self-maintaining bit. The reverse video indicates that the execution condition for that part of the program is still met.



- 6. Press the Shift+F4 Keys to release the forced status of any bits that have been artificially set.
- 7. Press the Shift+Esc Keys once to return to the monitor display and then again to return to the main online menu.

This completes the basic ladder programming and monitoring procedure. When you have finished, always take the CVSS offline by pressing the Shift+F1 Keys from the main online menu, remove any floppy disks, and turn off power to the computer and PC.

# 4-3 Using I/O Names

I/O names can be assigned to bit addresses, word addresses, step numbers, action numbers, or transition numbers with the Edit I/O Names operation. During programming, I/O names can be input into the program instead of bit and word addresses.

I/O names will not be displayed if bit and word addresses are input when the program is created. The PC does not use I/O names and I/O names are converted to bit and word addresses when the program is downloaded to the PC. When the program is later uploaded to the CVSS, it will not contain I/O names. I/O names can be displayed in the program again by performing the Link I/O Names to Program operation (in the Edit I/O Names operation) or loading the I/O names file from a data disk to the work disk.

### 4-3-1 Assigning I/O Names

I/O names are assigned using the following procedure. In this example the I/O name "START" will be assigned to an input bit CIO 000100 and "LAMP" will be assigned to an output bit CIO 000200.

Select "S:Edit I/O names" from the main offline menu. The I/O names list will appear and the cursor will be in the address input area at the bottom of the display.

3. Type START (the I/O name) and press the Enter Key. The cursor will move to the next line, and the input area at the bottom of the display will be reset.

The I/O name can be 2 to 8 characters long and is case sensitive. The first 2 characters must be letters, but the remaining characters can be letters or numbers. Data Area prefixes TR, ST, AC, TN, and any prefixes set with the Customize operation cannot be assigned as I/O names.

Only one I/O name can be assigned to any one bit or word, and the same I/O name cannot be assigned to more than one bit or word.

5. Press the Esc Key to return to the main offline menu. This completes the assignment of I/O names START and LAMP.

## 4-3-2 Writing a Program with I/O Names

I/O names are used in the program just like bit and word addresses in both ladder and mnemonic programming. The use of I/O names in ladder programming is demonstrated here with the main ladder diagram, but the procedure is the same for any ladder diagram program.

1. With the ladder diagram program view display on the display, press the F1 Key to enter the input mode.



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
- 2. Press the F7 Key to designate the first NO (normally open) condition, input the I/O name of the operand bit (START), and then press the Enter Key. (The F7 Key input is not necessary in the C input mode.) Press the F9 Key to designate the OUTPUT instruction, input the I/O name of the operand bit (LAMP), and then press the Enter Key.
  - a) If the display is set to "Ladder (Addr, I/O name)," the I/O bit addresses will appear above and the I/O names will appear below the ladder symbols. Up to 5 characters of each I/O name will be displayed.



b) If the display is set to "Ladder (Addr)," just the I/O addresses will appear.



c) If the display is set to "Ladder (I/O name)," just the I/O names will appear. Up to 5 characters of each I/O name will be displayed.



d) If the display is set to "Ladder (I/O comment 2)" or "Ladder (I/O comment 4)," I/O names will not be displayed.


## 4-3-3 Later Assignment of I/O Addresses

By using I/O names in the program, the program can be completed before I/O bit and word address allocations have been decided. I/O bit and word addresses can then be added or changed later. I/O names are used in the program just like bit and word addresses in both ladder and mnemonic programming.

The procedure for writing the program and later assigning I/O names is given below.

First the program is written with I/O names as bit operands. This procedure is described in 4-3-2 Writing a Program with I/O Names. In this example, the I/O names STOP and BUZZER were used.

If the display is set to "Ladder diagram (I/O No., I/O names)," the first five characters of the I/O names will appear below the ladder symbols, but I/O bit addresses will not appear above the ladder symbols until bit addresses have been assigned. Store the ladder diagram that you made. At this point the program is not complete because I/O addresses have not been assigned.




2. Assign bit addresses to the I/O names. This procedure is described in 4-3-1 Assigning I/O Names.

Move the cursor to the line where the I/O name STOP is listed. Type in the bit address and press the Enter Key twice. In this case, the STOP was assigned CIO 000101 and BUZZER was assigned CIO 000201.

3. The program is completed when all I/O names have been assigned I/O addresses. If you return to the ladder diagram display, both the I/O names and I/O bit addresses will be displayed, as shown below.

The following tables show whether or not I/O names and/or I/O addresses will be displayed and printed. The four factors affecting the display are listed below.

- **1, 2, 3...** 1. Has the program just been created (first table), or has the Link I/O Names to Program or I/O Names Retrieve operation been performed (second table)?
  - 2. What display setting has been selected?
  - 3. Was an I/O address or I/O name input in the program?
  - 4. Has the I/O name or address been assigned in the I/O names list?

- **Note** 1. An assigned I/O address means that an I/O number has been assigned to the I/O address using the Edit I/O Names operation.
  - The Ladder (Mnemonic) display setting behaves the same as the Ladder (I/O names, I/O No.) display setting. In SFC, either I/O Names or I/O No. must be selected with the Switch Display operation or printer settings.

# **SECTION 5** Error Processing

This section provides a list of error messages and probable causes of errors that can occur with CVSS.

# Error Messages

The following table lists the error messages and probable causes of errors that can occur with CVSS.

1st page	The displayed page is the first one.	There are no pages before this one.
Action # over max.	An action number exceeds the set max.	Set the action number below the max.
Address range err	Bit or word addresses have been specified incorrectly.	Verify that the bit or word addresses are compatible with the PC model and reenter.
Address too high	The search address is higher than the highest address in the program.	Check the address that was entered and reenter it correctly.
Already registered	The new data area prefix assigned in the Change Data Area Abbreviation operation has already been assigned.	Assign another prefix.
Batt low	The battery isn't connected or it has expired.	Check the battery and replace it if necessary.
Blk comment file error	The block comment data on the data disk has been damaged.	Check the data disk and program and correct if necessary.
Cannot execute for ladd only	The PC contains only ladder-diagram programs.	Do not attempt to use the debug operations for SFC programs for ladder-only programming. This operation is not supported for CVM1 CPU Units.
Can't change operand	An incorrect operand has been used in a ladder program change.	Check the program.
Can't write	The specified data area is read only.	Check the data area specification.



action	In SFC programs, the individual executable elements in an action block. An ac- tion can be defined either as a ladder diagram or as a single bit in memory.
Action Area	A memory area that contains flags that indicate when actions are active.
action block	A collection of all the actions for a single step in an SFC program. Each action is accompanied by its action qualifier, set value, and feedback variable.
action number	A number assigned to an action. Each action has a unique number. These num- bers are used to access and to control the status of the action.
action program	A ladder diagram program written to define an action.
action qualifier	A designation made for a action to control when the action is to be executed in respect to the status of the step.
active status	One of the two main statuses that a step can be in. Active status includes pause, halt, and execute status.
active step	A step that is in either pause, halt, or execute status. There can be more than one active step.
address	A number used to identify the location of data or programming instructions in memory or to identify the location of a network or a unit in a network.
advanced instruction	An instruction input with a function code that handles data processing opera- tions within ladder diagrams, as opposed to a basic instruction, which makes up the fundamental portion of a ladder diagram.
allocation	The process by which the PC assigns certain bits or words in memory for various functions. This includes pairing I/O bits to I/O points on Units.
analog	Something that represents or can process a continuous range of values as op- posed to values that can be represented in distinct increments. Something that represents or can process values represented in distinct increments is called digital.
Analog I/O Unit	I/O Units that convert I/O between analog and digital values. An Analog Input Input converts an analog input to a digital value for processing by the PC. An Analog Output Unit converts a digital value to an analog output.
AND	A logic operation whereby the result is true if and only if both premises are true. In ladder-diagram programming the premises are usually ON/OFF states of bits or the logical combination of such states called execution conditions.
AQ	See action qualifier.
area	See data area and memory area.
area prefix	A one or two letter prefix used to identify a memory area in the PC. All memory areas except the CIO area require prefixes to identify addresses in them.
ASCII	Short for American Standard Code for Information Interchange. ASCII is used to code characters for output to printers and other external devices.

Basic Rack	Any of the following Racks: CPU Rack, Expansion CPU Rack, or Expansion I/O Rack.	
BASIC Unit	A CPU Bus Unit used to run programs in BASIC.	
baud rate	The data transmission speed between two devices in a system measured in bits per second.	
BCD	Short for binary-coded decimal.	
binary	A number system where all numbers are expressed in base 2, i.e., numbers are written using only 0's and 1's. Each group of four binary bits is equivalent to one hexadecimal digit. Binary data in memory is thus often expressed in hexadecimal for convenience.	
binary-coded decimal	A system used to represent numbers so that every four binary bits is numerically equivalent to one decimal digit.	
bit	The smallest piece of information that can be represented on a computer. A bit has the value of either zero or one, corresponding to the electrical signals ON and OFF. A bit represents one binary digit. Some bits at particular addresses are allocated to special purposes, such as holding the status of input from external devices, while other bits are available for general use in programming.	
bit address	The location in memory where a bit of data is stored. A bit address specifies the data area and word that is being addressed as well as the number of the bit with- in the word.	
bit number	A number that indicates the location of a bit within a word. Bit 00 is the rightmost (least-significant) bit; bit 15 is the leftmost (most-significant) bit.	
block	See logic block and instruction block.	
block comment	A comment placed in a ladder diagrams that provides user information on an in- struction block.	
branching	In SFC programs, a means of controlling program flow so that one step leads to two or more steps. See <i>conditional branch</i> and <i>parallel branch</i> .	
buffer	A temporary storage space for data in a computerized device.

character code	A numeric (usually binary) code used to represent an alphanumeric character.	
checksum	A sum transmitted with a data pack in communications. The checksum can be recalculated from the received data to confirm that the data in the transmission has not been corrupted.	
CIO Area	A memory area used to control I/O and to store and manipulate data. CIO Area addresses do not require prefixes.	
common (link) parameter table	A table of settings in a SYSMAC LINK System that specifies what words are to be used in the data links for all PCs in the SYSMAC LINK System. See <i>refresh</i> parameter table.	
common data	Data that is stored in a memory of a PC and which is shared by other PCs in the same the same system. Each PC has a specified section(s) of the area allocated to it. Each PC writes to the section(s) allocated to it and reads the sections allocated to the other PCs with which it shares the common data.	
Completion Flag	A flag used with a timer or counter that turns ON when the timer has timed out or the counter has reached its set value.	
condition	A symbol placed on an instruction line to indicate an instruction that controls the execution condition for the terminal instruction. Each condition is assigned a bit in memory that determines its status. The status of the bit assigned to each condition determines the next execution condition. Conditions correspond to LOAD, LOAD NOT, AND, AND NOT, OR, or OR NOT instructions.	
conditional branch	A branch in an SFC program where one step is connected to multiple steps but the active status can be transferred to only one step at a time.	
conditional join	In an SFC program, a location where multiple steps coming from the same con- ditional branch return to a single step.	
constant	An input for an operand in which the actual numeric value is specified. Constants can be input for certain operands in place of memory area addresses. Some operands must be input as constants.

Control System	All of the hardware and software components used to control other devices. A Control System includes the PC System, the PC programs, and all I/O devices that are used to control or obtain feedback from the controlled system.
controlled system	The devices that are being controlled by a PC System.
count pulse	The signal counted by a counter.
counter	A dedicated group of digits or words in memory used to count the number of times a specific process has occurred, or a location in memory accessed through a TC bit and used to count the number of times the status of a bit or an execution condition has changed from OFF to ON.
CPU	See central processing unit.
CPU Bus Unit	A special Unit used with CV-series PCs that mounts to the CPU bus. This con- nection to the CPU bus enables special data links, data transfers, and process- ing.
CPU Rack	The main Rack in a building-block PC, the CPU Rack contains the CPU, a Power Supply, and other Units. The CPU Rack, along with the Expansion CPU Rack, provides both an I/O bus and a CPU bus.
cross-reference	An operation that searches the program for usage of a specific data area bit or word to see where and how the bit or word is being used. Used during program changes and debugging.
C-series PC	Any of the following PCs: C2000H, C1000H, C500, C200H, C40H, C28H, C20H, C60K, C60P, C40K, C40P, C28K, C28P, C20K, C20P, C120, or C20.
custom data area	A data area defined by the user within the CIO Area. Custom data areas can be set from the CVSS and certain other Programming Devices.
CV Support Software	A programming package run on an IBM PC/AT or compatible to serve as a Pro- gramming Device for CV-series PCs.
CV-mode	A form of communications useable only with CV-series PCs. See C-mode.
CV-series PC	Any of the following PCs: CV500, CV1000, CV2000, or CVM1
CVSS	See CV Support Software.
cycle	One unit of processing performed by the CPU, including SFC/ladder program execution, peripheral servicing, I/O refreshing, etc. The cycle is called the scan with C-series PCs.

cycle time	The time required to complete one cycle of CPU processing.
cyclic interrupt	See scheduled interrupt.
data area	An area in the PC's memory that is designed to hold a specific type of data.
data area boundary	The highest address available within a data area. When designating an operand that requires multiple words, it is necessary to ensure that the highest address in the data area is not exceeded.
data disk	A disk that is used to store user data.
data length	In communications, the number of bits that is to be treated as one unit in data transmissions.
data link	An automatic data transmission operation that allows PCs or Units within PC to pass data back and forth via common data areas.
data link area	A common data area established through a data link.
data link table	A table of settings kept in memory that specifies what words are to be part of a data link for all PCs involved in the link.
data register	A storage location in memory used to hold data. In CV-series PCs, data registers are used with or without index registers to hold data used in indirect addressing.
data trace	A process in which changes in the contents of specific memory locations are re- corded during program execution.
data transfer	Moving data from one memory location to another, either within the same device or between different devices connected via a communications line or network.
debug	A process by which a draft program is corrected until it operates as intended. Debugging includes both the removal of syntax errors, as well as the fine-tuning of timing and coordination of control operations.
DEBUG mode	A mode of PC operation which enables basic debugging of user programs.
decimal	A number system where numbers are expressed to the base 10. In a PC all data is ultimately stored in binary form, four binary bits are often used to represent one decimal digit, via a system called binary-coded decimal.
decrement	Decreasing a numeric value, usually by 1.
default	A value automatically set by the PC when the user does not specifically set another value. Many devices will assume such default conditions upon the appli- cation of power.
definer	A number used as an operand for an instruction but that serves to define the in- struction itself, rather that the data on which the instruction is to operate. Defin- ers include jump numbers, subroutine numbers, etc.
destination	The location where an instruction places the data on which it is operating, as op- posed to the location from which data is taken for use in the instruction. The loca- tion from which data is taken is called the source.
differentiated instruction	An instruction that is executed only once each time its execution condition goes from OFF to ON. Non-differentiated instructions are executed for each scan as long as the execution condition stays ON.

differentiation instruction	An instruction used to ensure that the operand bit is never turned ON for more than one scan after the execution condition goes either from OFF to ON for a Differentiate Up instruction or from ON to OFF for a Differentiate Down instruc- tion.
digit	A unit of storage in memory that consists of four bits.
DIP switch	Dual in-line package switch, an array of pins in a signal package that is mounted to a circuit board and is used to set operating parameters.
distributed control	A automation concept in which control of each portion of an automated system is located near the devices actually being controlled, i.e., control is decentralized and 'distributed' over the system. Distributed control is a concept basic to PC Systems.
DM Area	A data area used to hold only word data. Words in the DM area cannot be accessed bit by bit.
DM word	A word in the DM Area.
downloading	The process of transferring a program or data from a higher-level or host com- puter to a lower-level or slave computer. If a Programming Device is involved, the Programming Device is considered the host computer.
DR	See data register.
dummy step	A step in an SFC program that contains no actions, such as one used to transfer execution to a subroutine.
EEPROM	Electrically erasable programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM in which stored data can be erased and reprogrammed. This is accomplished using a special control lead connected to the EEPROM chip and can be done without having to remove the EEPROM chip from the device in which it is mounted.
electrical noise	Random variations of one or more electrical characteristics such as voltage, cur- rent, and data, which might interfere with the normal operation of a device.
EM Area	Extended Data Memory Area; an area that can be optionally added to certain PCs to enable greater data storage. Functionally, the EM Area operates like the DM Area. Area addresses are prefixes with E and only words can be accessed. The EM Area is separated into multiple banks.
entry step	A step in SFC programming that begins a subchart or interrupt program.
entry terminal	A triangular symbol in SFC programming that comes before the entry step in a subchart or interrupt program.
EPROM	Erasable programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM in which stored data can be erased, by ultraviolet light or other means, and reprogrammed.
error code	A numeric code generated to indicate that an error exists, and something about the nature of the error. Some error codes are generated by the system; others are defined in the program by the operator.
Error Log Area	An area in System DM that is used to store records indicating the time and nature of errors that have occurred in the system.
even parity	A communication setting that adjusts the number of ON bits so that it is always even. See <i>parity</i> .

event processing	Processing that is performed in response to an event, e.g., an interrupt signal.
execution condition	The ON or OFF status under which an instruction is executed. The execution condition is determined by the logical combination of conditions on the same instruction line and up to the instruction currently being executed.

execution time	The time required for the CPU to execute either an individual instruction or an entire program.

FA	Factory automation.
factory computer	A general-purpose computer, usually quite similar to a business computer, that is used in automated factory control.
FAL error	An error generated from the user program by execution of an FAL(006) instruc- tion.
FALS error	An error generated from the user program by execution of an FALS(007) instruc- tion or an error generated by the system.
FAT	File Allocation Table. This is an area of a floppy or hard disk which contains infor- mation about the location of the files on the disk.
fatal error	An error that stops PC operation and requires correction before operation can continue.
fatal SFC error	An error in SFC programming that makes further program execution impossible.
FCS	See frame checksum.
feedback variable	One of the input fields in an action block in a SFC program. Memory area ad- dresses can be input for feedback variables as desired by the user, but do not affect operation in any way.
file directory	A list of the files on a floppy or hard disk.
filename extension	The portion of a filename after the period. The extension can be no longer than 3 characters. It is usually used to indicate the type of the file (e.g. BAS indicates files containing BASIC programs, and DAT indicates files containing data).

flag	A dedicated bit in memory that is set by the system to indicate some type of oper- ating status. Some flags, such as the carry flag, can also be set by the operator or via the program.

frame checksum	The results of exclusive ORing all data within a specified calculation range. The frame checksum can be calculated on both the sending and receiving end of a data transfer to confirm that data was transmitted correctly.
function code	A two-digit number used to input an instruction into the PC.
FV	See feedback variable.
GPC	An acronym for Graphic Programming Console.
Graphic Programming Console	A programming device with advanced programming and debugging capabilities to facilitate PC operation. A Graphic Programming Console is provided with a large display onto which ladder-diagram programs can be written directly in lad- der-diagram symbols for input into the PC without conversion to mnemonic form.
guidance display	Messages that appear on-screen to aid the operator.
halt	One of the three active statuses of steps in an SFC program. Steps in halt status are not executed.
hardware error	An error originating in the hardware structure (electronic components) of the PC, as opposed to a software error, which originates in software (i.e., programs).
hexadecimal	A number system where all numbers are expressed to the base 16. In a PC all data is ultimately stored in binary form, however, displays and inputs on Pro- gramming Devices are often expressed in hexadecimal to simplify operation. Each group of four binary bits is numerically equivalent to one hexadecimal digit.
hold bit	A bit in memory designated to maintain status when the PC's operating mode is changed or power is turned off and then back on.
hold Rack	A Rack designated to maintain output status when the PC's operating mode is changed or power is turned off and then back on.
holding area	Words in memory designated to maintain status when the PC's operating mode is changed or power is turned off and then back on.
host computer	A computer that is used to transfer data to or receive data from a PC in a Host Link system. The host computer is used for data management and overall sys- tem control. Host computers are generally small personal or business comput- ers.
host interface	An interface that allows communications with a host computer.
Host Link System	A system with one or more host computers connected to one or more PCs via Host Link Units or host interfaces so that the host computer can be used to trans- fer data to and from the PC(s). Host Link Systems enable centralized manage- ment and control of PC Systems.

Host Link Unit	An interface used to connect a C-series PC to a host computer in a Host Link System.
I/O allocation	The process by which the PC assigns certain bits in memory for various func- tions. This includes pairing I/O bits to I/O points on Units.
I/O bit	A bit in memory used to hold I/O status. Input bits reflect the status of input termi- nals; output bits hold the status for output terminals.
I/O Block	Either an Input Block or an Output Block. I/O Blocks provide mounting positions for replaceable relays.
I/O capacity	The number of inputs and outputs that a PC is able to handle. This number ranges from around one hundred for smaller PCs to two thousand for the largest ones.
I/O comment	A comment in a program that is related to the use of operands.
I/O Control Unit	A Unit mounted to the CPU Rack to monitor and control I/O points on Expansion CPU Racks or Expansion I/O Racks.
I/O delay	The delay in time from when a signal is sent to an output to when the status of the output is actually in effect or the delay in time from when the status of an input changes until the signal indicating the change in the status is received.
I/O device	A device connected to the I/O terminals on I/O Units, Special I/O Units, etc. I/O devices may be either part of the Control System, if they function to help control other devices, or they may be part of the controlled system.
I/O Interface Unit	A Unit mounted to an Expansion CPU Rack or Expansion I/O Rack to interface the Rack to the CPU Rack.
I/O interrupt	An interrupt generated by a signal from I/O.
I/O interrupt entry terminal	An entry terminal for an I/O interrupt program.
I/O interrupt return terminal	A return terminal for an I/O interrupt program.
I/O name	A name assigned to a bit or word used in a program that can be used to input the bit or word, or can be displayed to indicate the bit or word on a monitor.
I/O point	The place at which an input signal enters the PC System, or at which an output signal leaves the PC System. In physical terms, I/O points correspond to terminals or connector pins on a Unit; in terms of programming, an I/O points correspond to I/O bits in the IR area.
I/O refreshing	The process of updating output status sent to external devices so that it agrees with the status of output bits held in memory and of updating input bits in memory so that they agree with the status of inputs from external devices.
I/O response time	The time required for an output signal to be sent from the PC in response to an input signal received from an external device.
I/O table	A table created within the memory of the PC that lists the I/O words allocated to each Unit in the PC System. The I/O table can be created by, or modified from, a Programming Device.
I/O Terminal	A Remote I/O Unit connected in a Wired Remote I/O System to provide a limited number of I/O points at one location. There are several types of I/O Terminals.

I/O Unit	The most basic type of Unit mounted to a Backplane. I/O Units include Input Units and Output Units, each of which is available in a range of specifications. I/O Units do not include Special I/O Units, Link Units, etc.

I/O word	A word in the CIO area that is allocated to a Unit in the PC System and is used to hold I/O status for that Unit.
IBM PC/AT or compatible	A computer that has similar architecture to, that is logically compatible with, and that can run software designed for an IBM PC/AT computer.
immediate refreshing	A form of I/O refreshing that is executed by certain types of instruction when the instruction is executed to ensure that the most current input status is used for an operand or to ensure that an output is effective immediately.
inactive status	The status of a step in an SFC program in which the actions within that step are not executed, with the exception of any actions with action qualifiers that extend execution beyond active status. Inactive status also enables a step to go into active status provided other conditions are met.
increment	Increasing a numeric value, usually by 1.
index register	A data storage location used with or without a data register in indirect address- ing.
initial step	A step that automatically goes to active status when SFC program execution is begun.
initialize	Part of the startup process whereby some memory areas are cleared, system setup is checked, and default values are set.
input	The signal coming from an external device into the PC. The term input is often used abstractly or collectively to refer to incoming signals.
input bit	A bit in the CIO area that is allocated to hold the status of an input.
Input Block	A Unit used in combination with a Remote Interface to create an I/O Terminal. An Input Block provides mounting positions for replaceable relays. Each relay can be selected according to specific input requirements.
input device	An external device that sends signals into the PC System.
input point	The point at which an input enters the PC System. Input points correspond phys- ically to terminals or connector pins.
input signal	A change in the status of a connection entering the PC. Generally an input signal is said to exist when, for example, a connection point goes from low to high voltage or from a nonconductive to a conductive state.
Input Terminal	An I/O Terminal that provides input points.
insert	The process by which a program section held in a peripheral device is saved in PC memory at the location just prior to the last program section that was saved.
instruction	A direction given in the program that tells the PC of the action to be carried out, and the data to be used in carrying out the action. Instructions can be used to

interrupt (signal)	A signal that stops normal program execution and causes a subroutine to be run or other processing to take place.
Interrupt Input Unit	A Rack-mounting Unit used to input external interrupts into a PC System.
interrupt program	A program that is executed in response to an interrupt.
inverse condition	See normally closed condition.
IOIF	An acronym for I/O Interface Unit.
IOM (Area)	A collective memory area containing all of the memory areas that can be ac- cessed by bit, including timer and counter Completion Flags. The IOM Area in- cludes all memory area memory addresses between 0000 and 0FFF.
JIS	An acronym for Japanese Industrial Standards.
joining	A process used in SFC programs to return execution from steps on multiple branch lines to a single step.
jump	A type of programming where execution moves directly from one point in a pro- gram to another, without sequentially executing any instructions in between. Jumps in ladder diagrams are usually conditional on an execution condition; jumps in SFC programs are conditional on the step status and transition condi- tion status before the jump.
jump number	A definer used with a jump that defines the points from and to which a jump is to be made.
Kanji character	A character in one of the three sets of characters used to write the Japanese language

keyed retrieval	A method for searching for text that allows an item to be found though inputting only a portion of it. For example, I/O comments can be found by inputting only a portion from the beginning of the text string of which the I/O comment exists.
ladder diagram (program)	A form of program arising out of relay-based control systems that uses cir- cuit-type diagrams to represent the logic flow of programming instructions. The appearance of the program is similar to a ladder, and thus the name.
ladder diagram symbol	A symbol used in drawing a ladder-diagram program.
leading zero	One of one or more consecutive zeros in the leftmost digits of an address or nu- meric value.
least-significant (bit/word)	See rightmost (bit/word).
LED	Acronym for light-emitting diode; a device used as for indicators or displays.
leftmost (bit/word)	The highest numbered bits of a group of bits, generally of an entire word, or the highest numbered words of a group of words. These bits/words are often called most-significant bits/words.
link	A hardware or software connection formed between two Units. "Link" can refer either to a part of the physical connection between two Units or a software con- nection created to data existing at another location (i.e., data links).
Link Area	A data area that is designed for use in data links.
link parameter table	See common link parameter table.
Link System	A system used to connect remote I/O or to connect multiple PCs in a network. Link Systems include the following: SYSMAC BUS Remote I/O Systems, SYS- MAC BUS/2 Remote I/O Systems, SYSMAC LINK Systems, Host Link Systems, and SYSMAC NET Link Systems.
Link Unit	Any of the Units used to connect a PC to a Link System. These include Remote I/O Units, SYSMAC LINK Units, and SYSMAC NET Link Units.
load	The processes of copying data either from an external device or from a storage area to an active portion of the system such as a display buffer. Also, an output device connected to the PC is called a load.
local network table	A table that specifies all of the networks that a PC belongs to and the unit num- bers of the Units connecting the PC to each of these networks.
logic block	A group of instructions that is logically related in a ladder-diagram program and that requires logic block instructions to relate it to other instructions or logic blocks.
logic block instruction	An instruction used to locally combine the execution condition resulting from a logic block with a current execution condition. The current execution condition could be the result of a single condition, or of another logic block. AND Load and OR Load are the two logic block instructions.
loop-back	The processes of using an alternate communications path that runs in the re- verse direction of the normal communications path to prevent communications from being disabled when communications along the normal path are not possi- ble.

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machine code	The binary program code that is actual executed by a CPU.
machine language	A programming language in which the program is written directly into machine code.
main program	All of a program except for subroutine and interrupt programs.
mark trace	A process in which changes in the contents of specific memory locations are re- corded during program execution using MARK (174) instructions.
masked bit	A bit whose status has been temporarily made ineffective.
masking	'Covering' an interrupt signal so that the interrupt is not effective until the mask is removed.
Master	Short for Remote I/O Master Unit.
master	In a SYSMAC NET Link System, a Unit specified to manage network communi- cations.
master number	A number assigned to a master in a SYSMAC NET Link System. This number is different from the unit number.
MCR Unit	Magnetic Card Reader Unit.
megabyte	A unit of storage equal to one million bytes.
memory area	Any of the areas in the PC used to hold data or programs.
memory card	A data storage media similar to a floppy disk.
memory switch	A bit or bits in memory that are used to set operating parameters similar to the way a hardware switch would be.
message number	A number assigned to a message generated with the MSG(195) instruction.
mnemonic code	A form of a ladder-diagram program that consists of a sequential list of the in- structions without using a ladder diagram.
MONITOR mode	A mode of PC operation in which normal program execution is possible, and which allows modification of data held in memory. Used for monitoring or debug- ging the PC.
most-significant (bit/word)	See leftmost (bit/word).
MS-DOS	An operating system in common use on smaller computers.
NC input	An input that is normally closed, i.e., the input signal is considered to be present when the circuit connected to the input opens.
negative delay	A delay set for a data trace in which recording data begins before the trace signal by a specified amount.
nesting	Programming one loop within another loop, programming a call to a subroutine within another subroutine, or programming an IF–ELSE programming section within another IF–ELSE section.
Network Service Board	A device with an interface to connect devices other than PCs to a SYSMAC NET Link System.

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Network Service Unit	A Unit that provides two interfaces to connect peripheral devices to a SYSMAC NET Link System.	
network support table	Tables of settings used to establish operating parameters for SYSMAC LINK and SYSMAC NET Link Systems.	
NO input	An input that is normally open, i.e., the input signal is considered to be present when the circuit connected to the input closes.	
node	One of the positions in a LAN. Each node incorporates a device that can commu- nicate with the devices at all of the other nodes. The device at a node is identified by the node number.	
node number	A number used to identify a node on a network. The node number of a CV-series PC is called the "unit number" in the PC Setup.	
noise interference	Disturbances in signals caused by electrical noise.

operating error	An error that occurs during actual PC operation as opposed to an initialization error, which occurs before actual operations can begin.
optical cable link	In a Wired Remote I/O System, an optical cable connecting two Converting Link Adapters.
optical communications	A communications method in which signals are sent over optical fiber cable to prevent noise interference and increase transmission distance.
Optical I/O Unit	A Unit that is connected in an Optical Remote I/O System to provide 8 I/O points. Optical I/O Units are not mounted to a Rack.
Optical Master	Short for Optical Remote I/O Master Unit.
Optical Slave Rack	A Slave Rack connected through an Optical Remote I/O Slave Unit.

programmed alarm	An alarm given as a result of execution of an instruction designed to generate the alarm in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
programmed error	An error arising as a result of the execution of an instruction designed to gener- ate the error in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
programmed message	A message generated as a result of execution of an instruction designed to gen- erate the message in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
Programming Console	The simplest form or programming device available for a PC. Programming Consoles are available both as hand-held models and as CPU-mounting models.
Programming Device	A Peripheral Device used to input a program into a PC or to alter or monitor a program already held in the PC. There are dedicated programming devices, such as Programming Consoles, and there are non-dedicated devices, such as a host computer.
PROM	Programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM into which the program or data may be written after manufacture, by a customer, but which is fixed from that time on.
PROM Writer	A peripheral device used to write programs and other data into a ROM for per- manent storage and application.
prompt	A message or symbol that appears on a display to request input from the opera- tor.
protocol	The parameters and procedures that are standardized to enable two devices to communicate or to enable a programmer or operator to communicate with a device.

Rack	An assembly that forms a functional unit in a Rack PC System. A Rack consists of a Backplane and the Units mounted to it. These Units include the Power Sup- ply, CPU, and I/O Units. rack number	A number assigned to a Rack according to the order that it is connected to the CPU Rack, with the CPU Rack generally being rack number 0.	
Rack PC	A PC that is composed of Units mounted to one or more Racks. This configura- tion is the most flexible, and most large PCs are Rack PCs. A Rack PC is the opposite of a Package-type PC, which has all of the basic I/O, storage, and con- trol functions built into a single package.	
RAM	Random access memory; a data storage media. RAM will not retain data when power is disconnected.	
RAS	An acronym for reliability, assurance, safety.	
read-only area	A memory area from which the user can read status but to which data cannot be written.	
refresh	The process of updating output status sent to external devices so that it agrees with the status of output bits held in memory and of updating input bits in memory so that they agree with the status of inputs from external devices.	
refresh parameter (table)	A table of settings that specifies which words in the data links for a System are to be refreshed for a particular PC. See <i>common link parameter table</i> .	
Register Area	A memory are that contains both index registers and data registers.

retry	The process whereby a device will re-transmit data which has resulted in an er- ror message from the receiving device.
return step	A step in SFC programming that ends a subroutine or interrupt program.
return terminal	A triangular symbol in SFC programming that comes after the return step in a subroutine or interrupt program.
reverse video	Displaying characters on a monitor so that the normal colors of the characters and the background are reversed.
right-hand instruction	See terminal instruction.
rightmost (bit/word)	The lowest numbered bits of a group of bits, generally of an entire word, or the lowest numbered words of a group of words. These bits/words are often called least-significant bits/words.
rising edge	The point where a signal actually changes from an OFF to an ON status.
ROM	Read only memory; a type of digital storage that cannot be written to. A ROM chip is manufactured with its program or data already stored in it and can never be changed. However, the program or data can be read as many times as desired.
routing table	Tables of setting that specify what networks a device is a member of and what nodes must be passed through to reach other specific networks. See <i>local network table</i> and <i>relay network table</i> .
RS-232C interface	An industry standard for serial communications.
RS-422 interface	An industry standard for serial communications.
RUN mode	The operating mode used by the PC for normal control operations.
rung	See instruction line.
scan	The process used to execute a ladder-diagram program. The program is ex- amined sequentially from start to finish and each instruction is executed in turn

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	based on execution conditions. The scan also includes peripheral processing, I/O refreshing, etc. The scan is called the cycle with CV-series PCs.
scan time	The time required for a single scan of a ladder-diagram program.
scheduled interrupt	An interrupt that is automatically generated by the system at a specific time or program location specified by the operator. Scheduled interrupts result in the execution of specific subroutines that can be used for instructions that must be executed repeatedly at a specified interval of time.
screen editor	A program that is used on-screen to edit files.
self diagnosis	A process whereby the system checks its own operation and generates a warn- ing or error if an abnormality is discovered.
sequential function chart	A programming method that allows overall processing to be programmed as a flowchart of steps and detailed processing to be programmed as actions within each step.
series	A wiring method in which Units are wired consecutively in a string. In Link Sys- tems wired through Link Adapters, the Units are still functionally wired in series, even though Units are placed on branch lines.
servicing	The process whereby the PC provides data to or receives data from external devices or remote I/O Units, or otherwise handles data transactions for Link Systems.
set	The process of turning a bit or signal ON.
set value	The value from which a decrementing counter starts counting down or to which an incrementing counter counts up (i.e., the maximum count), or the time from which or for which a timer starts timing. Set value is abbreviated SV.
SFC	An acronym for sequential function chart.
SFC jump	A type of programming where execution moves directly from one step in a pro- gram to another step, without sequentially executing the steps in between.
SFC jump entry	The symbol or process used in an SFC program to indicate an SFC jump.
sheet	A unit of programming in an SFC program. There is a limit on the number of steps that can be contained within a single sheet and the types of processes that can take place between sheets.
SIOU	See Special I/O Unit.
Slave	See Remote I/O Slave Unit.
Slave Rack	A Rack containing a Remote I/O Slave Unit and controlled through a Remote I/O Master Unit. Slave Racks are generally located away from the CPU Rack.
software error	An error that originates in a software program.
software protect	A means of protecting data from being changed that uses software as opposed to a physical switch or other hardware setting.
software switch	See memory switch.

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source code	The code in which a program is written, e.g., ASCII. Source code must be converted to object code before execution.	
Special I/O Unit	A Unit that is designed for a specific purpose. Special I/O Units include Position Control Units, High-speed Counter Units, Analog I/O Units, etc.	
SRAM	Static random access memory; a data storage media.	
step	A basic unit of execution in an SFC program. Steps are used to organize an SFC program by process and control the overall flow of program execution.	
Step Area	A memory area that contains a flag that indicates the status of steps in an SFC program.	
step timer	A timer used to time execution of actions within a step in an SFC program.	
store	The process by which a program section held in a peripheral device is saved in PC memory at the same location from which it was read.	
string	A sequence of letters, numbers, and/or symbols stored in memory.	
subchart	A section of an SFC program that is executed like a subroutine. See subroutine.	
subchart dummy step	A step in an SFC program that is used to call (activate) a subchart.	
subchart entry step	A step in SFC programming that begins a subchart.	
subchart entry terminal	A triangular symbol in SFC programming that comes before the entry step in a subchart.	
subchart return step	A step in SFC programming that ends a subchart.	
subchart return terminal	A triangular symbol in SFC programming that comes after the return step in sub- chart.	
sub-loop	A line mode used in a Remote I/O System to maintain communications when an error occurs on the positive line.	
subroutine	A group of instructions placed separate from the main program and executed only when called from the main program or activated by an interrupt.	
subroutine number	A definer used to identify the subroutine that a subroutine call or interrupt activates.	
SV	Abbreviation for set value.	
synchronous execution	Execution of programs and servicing operations in which program execution and servicing are synchronized so that all servicing operations are executed each time the programs are executed.	
syntax	The form of a program statement (as opposed to its meaning). For example, the two statements, LET $A=B+B$ and LET $A=B*2$ use different syntaxes, but have the same meaning.	
syntax error	An error in the way in which a program is written. Syntax errors can include 'spelling' mistakes (i.e., a function code that does not exist), mistakes in specify- ing operands within acceptable parameters (e.g., specifying read-only bits as a	

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	destination), and mistakes in actual application of instructions (e.g., a call to a subroutine that does not exist).
SYSMAC BUS/2 Remote I/O System	A remote I/O system used to enable placing Slaves at remote locations to extend the applicable range of a PC System.
SYSMAC LINK System	A communications system used to create data links and enable network com- munications between PCs.
SYSMAC NET Link System	An optical LAN formed from PCs connected through SYSMAC NET Link Units. A SYSMAC NET Link System also normally contains nodes interfacing computers and other peripheral devices. PCs in the SYSMAC NET Link System can pass data back and forth, receive commands from any interfaced computer, and share any interfaced peripheral device.
SYSMAC NET Link Unit	The Unit used to connect PCs to a SYSMAC NET Link System.
system configuration	The arrangement in which Units in a System are connected. This term refers to the conceptual arrangement and wiring together of all the devices needed to comprise the System. In OMRON terminology, system configuration is used to describe the arrangement and connection of the Units comprising a Control Sys- tem that includes one or more PCs.
System DM	A dedicated portion of the DM area that is used for special purposes in control- ling and managing the PC. Includes the Program Version, Parameter Area, Pa- rameter Backup Area, User Program Header, and Error Log Area.
system error	An error generated by the system, as opposed to one resulting from execution of an instruction designed to generate an error.
system error message	An error message generated by the system, as opposed to one resulting from execution of an instruction designed to generate a message.
terminal instruction	An instruction placed on the right side of a ladder diagram that uses the final ex- ecution conditions of an instruction line.
terminator	The code comprising an asterisk and a carriage return (* CR) which indicates the end of a block of data in communications between devices. Frames within a multi-frame block are separated by delimiters. Also a Unit in a Link System designated as the last Unit on the communications line.
timer	A location in memory accessed through a TC bit and used to time down from the timer's set value. Timers are turned ON and reset according to their execution conditions.
TR Area	A data area used to store execution conditions so that they can be reloaded later for use with other instructions.
TR bit	A bit in the TR Area.
trace	An operation whereby the program is executed and the resulting data is stored to enable step-by-step analysis and debugging.
trace memory	A memory area used to store the results of trace operations.
transfer	The process of moving data from one location to another within the PC, or be- tween the PC and external devices. When data is transferred, generally a copy

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	of the data is sent to the destination, i.e., the content of the source of the transfer is not changed.
transition	A status in a SFC program that determines when active status is transferred from one step to another. Transitions can be defined either as the status of a bit or as an execution condition resulting from a ladder diagram.
Transition Area	A memory area that contains Transition Flags.
Transition Flag	A flag that indicates when a transition is ON or OFF.
transition number	A number assigned to a transition and used to access its Transition Flag.
transmission distance	The distance that a signal can be transmitted.
trigger	A signal used to activate some process, e.g., the execution of a trace operation.
trigger address	An address in the program that defines the beginning point for tracing. The ac- tual beginning point can be altered from the trigger by defining either a positive or negative delay.
UM area	The memory area used to hold the active program, i.e., the program that is being currently executed.
Unit	In OMRON PC terminology, the word Unit is capitalized to indicate any product sold for a PC System. Though most of the names of these products end with the word Unit, not all do, e.g., a Remote Terminal is referred to in a collective sense as a Unit. Context generally makes any limitations of this word clear.
unit address	A number used to control network communications. Unit addresses are com- puted for Units in various ways, e.g., 10 hex is added to the unit number to deter- mine the unit address for a CPU Bus Unit.
unit number	A number assigned to some Link Units, Special I/O Units, and CPU Bus Units to facilitate identification when assigning words or other operating parameters.
unmasked bit	A bit whose status is effective. See masked bit.
uploading	The process of transferring a program or data from a lower-level or slave com- puter to a higher-level or host computer. If a Programming Devices is involved, the Programming Device is considered the host computer.
vector table	A work file created by CVSS that is used by the software to access ladder pro- grams for editing. The vector table lists the first address of each ladder program block.
verification error	See I/O verification error.
volume label	The name of a volume of storage material (a floppy disk, hard disk, or memory card).
watchdog timer	A timer within the system that ensures that the scan time stays within specified limits. When limits are reached, either warnings are given or PC operation is stopped depending on the particular limit that is reached.
WDT	See watchdog timer.
wildcard	A special character used in a filename or extension to indicate zero or more pos- sible characters.

wire communications	A communications method in which signals are sent over wire cable. Although noise resistance and transmission distance can sometimes be a problem with wire communications, they are still the cheapest and the most common, and per- fectly adequate for many applications.
Wired Master	A Remote I/O Master Unit connected via 2-conductor wire cables.
Wired Master	A Remote I/O Slave Unit connected via 2-conductor wire cables.
Wired Slave Rack	A Slave Rack connected through a Wired Slave.
Wired System	A Remote I/O Master System connected via 2-conductor wire cables.
word	A unit of data storage in memory that consists of 16 bits. All data areas consists of words. Some data areas can be accessed only by words; others, by either words or bits.
word address	The location in memory where a word of data is stored. A word address must specify (sometimes by default) the data area and the number of the word that is being addressed.
word allocation	The process of assigning I/O words and bits in memory to I/O Units and termi- nals in a PC System to create an I/O Table.
Word Grouping	See custom data area.
work area	A part of memory containing work words/bits.
work bit	A bit in a work word.
work disk	The location is memory when data currently being worked with is stored.
work word	A word that can be used for data calculation or other manipulation in program- ming, i.e., a 'work space' in memory. A large portion of the IR area is always re- served for work words. Parts of other areas not required for special purposes may also be used as work words.
write protect switch	A switch used to write-protect the contents of a storage device, e.g., a floppy disk. If the hole on the upper left of a floppy disk is open, the information on this floppy disk cannot be altered.
write-protect	A state in which the contents of a storage device can be read but cannot be al- tered.
zero-cross refresh	An I/O refresh process in which I/O status is refreshed when the voltage of an AC power supply is at zero volts.
